Sicklebill Safaris

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TRIP REPORT Victoria – The Mallee 17th – 24th March 2021



PARTICIPANTS: Juliet Ferguson & Jenny Hartman TOUR LEADER: Scott Baker

This tour featured some of the major 'mallee' reserves of NW Victoria, Specifically Hattah-Kulkyne, Murray-Sunset and Wyperfeld National Parks. Report itself covers 20-23rd March [period in which I was involved].

Mallee ecosystem includes several vegetation communities extending through the arid zone of southern Australia. It is a rich and unique environment occupied by many specialised birds, mammals and reptiles.

We were fortunate to enjoy some good weather [warm, not oppressively hot]. Despite dry conditions, even by local standards, and having to navigate various park closures, this was a very enjoyable tour. We observed many of the mallee species and managed a few nice photos. We covered a lot of ground, much of it on foot but at a relaxed pace.

ITINERARY

[Mar 17] Arriving at Hattah –Kulkyne NP early morning we were immediately rewarded with large flock of **Regent Parrot** [c.60+ birds] roosting in trees and wheeling about. A nice start.

Spent morning working the *Triodia* [spinifex]/mallee woodland along the Nowingi and Konardin Tracks. This a well-known site for the endangered [and cryptic] **Mallee Emu-Wren**, which we heard but were unable to locate. They can be very difficult – never guaranteed. Some nice birding however, **Crested Bellbird**, **Blue-winged Parrot**, **Chestnut Quail-thrush** and **Gilbert's Whistler** recorded. Later, driving the nature circuit and Mournpall track added **White-browed** & **Chestnut-crowned Babblers**, **Hooded Robin**, **White-fronted Honeyeater**, **Apostlebird** and **Splendid Fairywren** [amongst others].

Both Lake Hattah and Mournpall were completely dry, and subsequently very few waterbirds were recorded. They can be productive when wet.

[Mar 18] Full day at the famous Pink Lakes [Murray-Sunset Nat Park]. These a series of [mostly dry] salt lakes, the pink colour a pigment produced by micro-algae. The impressive scenic value of lakes themselves and the high-quality surrounding mallee woodland provide some excellent photographic & birding opportunities. Soft, early morning light on many roosting parrots [Eastern Bluebonnet, Aus. Ringneck and Mulga Parrot] kept cameras busy. The highlight however was a nicely posed male Chestnut Quail-thrush we tracked down, allowing close approach and many photographs. There was also a fantastic close encounter with pair of low flying Wedge-tailed Eagles, directly overhead.

[Mar 19] From our accommodation at Patchewollock it was a short drive to the northern entrance of Wyperfeld Nat Park. Some excellent morning birding along Moonah track. This a native Cypress – Buloke woodland and site for the range restricted Whitebrowed Treecreeper, of which we saw several. We also had nice views of the often shy Southern Scrub-Robin and a family of Gilbert's Whistler. Other birds recorded were various honeyeaters [Striped, Singing, Spiny-cheeked & White-fronted] and several Regent Parrots.

A small mob of 6 Emu on the Meridian Track was one of very few encounters we had with this species.

[Mar 20] Final day, exploring southern Wyperfeld Nat Park. Walking the Discovery Trail was slow [bird-wise] but a confiding pair of **Shy Heathwren**, yet another cryptic mallee specialist was a highlight. A distant **Redthroat** remained in the 'heard-only' category.

We concluded tour on the Malleefowl Walk. There were a surprising number of quality birds at this location included several Honeyeater species [Brown-headed, White-eared, Yellow-plumed, Striped, Spiny-cheeked & White-fronted] plus flock of Varied Sittella [black-capped form], both Pardalotes [Striated & 'Yellow-rumped'], Inland Thornbill, Hooded Robin and the recently 'split' Western Whistler. All showing well and a great way to wrap things up.

Thank you, Juliet and Jenny, for being patient and adaptable and excellent company. It can be challenging birding in arid environments and facilities in remote areas are at times pretty basic. Jenny's contributions on the salad front [and the BBQ] were very much appreciated! Makes it easy with such great clients.

Several sites with a flock c.500+ arriving late afternoon in the township of Rainbow.

Psittaculidae

Regent Parrot *Polytelis anthopeplus*

Great to see in good number [c. 60 birds] in vicinity of Old Calder, Hattah NP. Some birds roosting allowed for nice views but kept distance. Also observed near Moonah track, Wyperfeld NP.

Red-rumped Parrot Psephotus haematonotus
Seen mostly at roadsides
Eastern Bluebonnet Northiella haematogaster
Quite common at Pink Lakes [Murray-Sunset NP], also Meridian track/Wymlet Tank.
Mulga Parrot Psephotellus varius
Several small flocks, both Pink Lakes and Moonah track [Wyperfeld NP]
Crimson Rosella Platycercus elegans ssp. flaveolus
'Yellow Rosella' observed near Lake Hattah, fairly reliable in this area.
Eastern Rosella Platycercus eximius
Common at Lake Albacutya.
Australian Ringneck Barnardius zonarius
Recorded daily, most of the Mallee sites.
Blue-winged Parrot Neophema chrysostoma
Single bird overhead and calling at Nowingi track. Uncommon here.

ClimacteridaeTreecreepersWhite-browed TreecreeperClimacteris affinis5+ birds observed near Moonah track [Wyperfeld NP]. Restricted range species in Vic.Brown TreecreeperClimacteris picumnus Rrecorded Lake Albacutya and Wyperfeld Entrance rd.

Splendid Fairywren Malurus splendens
Observed at mallee sites – Hattah/Pink Lakes & Wyperfeld.
Mallee Emuwren Stipiturus mallee (H)
Heard only at Nowingi Track. Rare mallee endemic, proving elusive on day.

White-fronted Chat *Epthianura albifrons* Small flock [7 birds] on the Pink Lakes entrance rd.

Striped Honeyeater Plectorhyncha lanceolata

Various sites. Reasonably common at Nowingi [Hattah] & Moonah track [Wyperfeld]

New Holland Honeyeater Phylidonyris novaehollandiae

Birds recorded in township of Rainbow.

White-eared Honeyeater Nesoptilotis leucotis

Several birds on the Discovery trail [Wyperfeld].

Brown-headed Honeyeater Melithreptus brevirostris

Small groups encountered, various sites.

White-fronted Honeyeater Purnella albifrons

We encountered birds on Lake Mournpall track [Hattah], also heard Moonah Track & Malleefowl walk [Wyperfeld]

Singing Honeyeater Gavicalis virescens

Various sites, daily.

Yellow-plumed Honeyeater Ptilotula ornate

Common mallee species

White-plumed Honeyeater Ptilotula penicillata

Birds recorded in township of Rainbow

Red Wattlebird Anthochaera carunculata

Recorded in township of Rainbow.

Spiny-cheeked Honeyeater Acanthagenys rufogularis

Fairly common throughout.

Noisy Miner Manorina melanocephala

Restricted to Red Gum sites – Lake Hattah and Lake Albacutya.

Yellow-throated Miner Manorina flavigula

Several birds in roadside mallee, Wymlet tank.

Pardalotidae

Spotted Pardalote Pardalotus punctatus ssp. xanthopygus 'Yellow-rumped Pardalote' Recorded several mallee sites.

Striated Pardalote Pardalotus striatus

Daily, various sites. Those observed all ssp. *substriatus*.

Acanthizidae

Weebill Smicrornis brevirostris

Common mallee species. Most days, various sites.

Shy Heathwren Hylacola cauta

Memorable encounter with pair of birds on the Discovery trail [Wyperfeld] Birds approached closely, and many photographs taken. Also recorded single bird at the Patchewollock State Forest.

Redthroat Pyrrholaemus brunneus (H)

Heard only on Discovery trail [Wyperfeld]

Inland Thornbill Acanthiza apicalis Seen most days, various mallee sites. Chestnut-rumped Thornbill Acanthiza uropygialis Fairly common throughout, various sites. Yellow-rumped Thornbill Acanthiza chrysorrhoa Seen in mixed flock on Mournpall track, Hattah NP. Yellow Thornbill Acanthiza nana Small groups, several mallee woodland sites. Southern Whiteface Aphelocephala leucopsis Daily. Reasonably common Hattah/Murray-Sunset & Wyperfeld.

PomatostomidaeBabblersWhite-browed Babbler Pomatostomus superciliosusRecorded daily, various sites.Chestnut-crowned Babbler Pomatostomus ruficepsSmall flock on Mournpall track, near Lake Hattah.

Quailthrush

Chestnut Quail-thrush *Cinclosoma castanotum* Briefly observed at Nowingi[Hattah] however we had excellent views of male perched & calling, near Pink Lakes.

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Rhipiduridae Fantails Willie Wagtail Rhipidura leucophrys Most sites. Monarchs Monarchidae Magpie-lark Grallina cyanoleuca Recorded in township of Rainbow. Corvidae Crows, Ravens

Black-faced Cuckooshrike Coracina novaehollandiae Single bird Lake Albacutya.

Varied Sittella Daphoenositta chrysoptera

Sittellas

6-7 birds ssp. pileata 'Black-capped Sittella' observed on Malleefowl track, south Wyperfeld.

Oreoicidae

Bellbirds

Crested Bellbird Oreoica gutturalis 1 bird observed on Konardin track [Hattah], others 'heard only'.

Pachycephalidae

Whistlers & Shrikethrushes

Gilbert's Whistler Pachycephala inornata 2 birds on Konardin track[Hattah] and family group [adult m & f plus juv. m] on Moonah track [Wyperfeld].

Western Whistler Pachycephala fuliginosa

Recent taxonomic revision of this taxa, previously considered a subspecies of Aus. Golden Whistler. 2 distinctive buff-bellied femaletypes on Malleefowl walk [Wyperfeld].

Rufous Whistler Pachycephala rufiventris

Nice adult male photographed near Moonah track[Wyperfeld].

Grey Shrikethrush Colluricincla harmonica

Daily, various sites.

Little Raven Corvus mellori 2 birds at Pink Lakes [Murray-Sunset].

Australian Raven Corvus coronoides

Daily, the common corvid up this way.

Corcoracidae

Mudnesters

White-winged Chough Corcorax melanorhamphos
Several groups [40+ birds] at Lake Albacutya, also recorded Hattah NP.
Apostlebird Stuthidae cinerea
Group of birds near ranger station, Hattah NP.

Petroicidae

Robins

Hooded Robin *Melanodryas cucullata*.
Nice views, both m & f, also juv. birds at both Hattah and Malleefowl walk, Wyperfeld.
Southern Scrub Robin *Drymodes brunneopygia*.
Pair of birds showing well at Moonah track, also Discovery Trail [Wyperfeld NP]
Jacky Winter *Microeca fascinans*.
Several sites, both Pink Lakes & Wyperfeld NP.
Red-capped Robin *Petroica goodenovii*.
Juv. bird on Mournpall track [Hattah] appeared to be this species.

Hirundinidae

Swallows, Martins

Welcome Swallow Hirundo neoxena.Several birds recorded in township of Rainbow.Tree Martin Petrochelidon nigricans.Recorded both Pink Lakes and Wyperfeld NP.

Sturnidae

Starlings

Common Starling Sturnus vulgaris.

Various sites in transit, also recorded Pink Lakes [Murray-Sunset]

Passeridae

Sparrows

Recorded at service station in Ouyen.

House Sparrow Passer domesticus.

Motacillidae

Pipits

Australian Pipit Anthus australis.

Several birds flushed from grassland, northern Wyperfeld.
